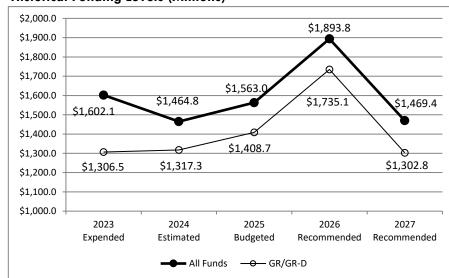

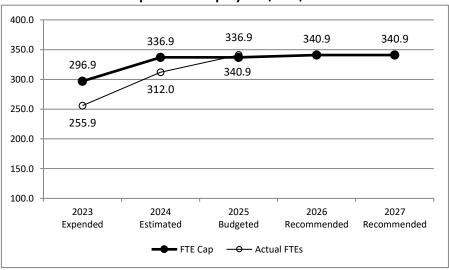

## Higher Education Coordinating Board Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - Senate

1. **Funding Overview of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB).** Appropriations to the THECB are composed of General Revenue, General Revenue-Dedicated (GR-D) from a tax on smokeless tobacco (Physician Education Loan Repayment Account), Federal Funds and Other Funds. Below is an overview of funding changes between the 2024-25 and 2026-27 biennia broken out by goal in the agency's budget structure.

#### **Goal A: Higher Education Support**

#### Increases

Academic Innovation and Success (A.1.3). Recommendations reflect an increase of \$0.4 million in General Revenue associated with salary adjustments. The total salary adjustment for the agency totaled \$2.2 million and was split between two strategies, Academic Innovation and Success (\$0.4 million) and Agency Operations (\$1.8 million).

#### Decreases

- Agency Operations (A.1.1). Recommended total funding of \$85.0 million reflects a reduction of \$5.0 million in General Revenue due to the removal of one-time funding appropriated in Senate Bill 30, 88th Legislature, for Cybersecurity Initiatives. This decrease was offset by a \$1.8 million increase associated with salary adjustments. The THECB received a \$15.0 million appropriation for Data Modernization in Senate Bill 30, 88th Legislature, that was expended in the 2024-25 biennium. During the development of the 2026-27 General Revenue Limit, this funding was taken out of the agency's Base Line Request. The agency requested an exceptional item for "Partial Restoration of Base Funding for Technology Efforts and Modernization" for ongoing costs associated with this appropriation. Based on information provided by the agency and DIR, recommendations maintain this \$15.0 million for the 2026-27 biennium.
- Student Loan Programs (A.1.2). Recommended funding levels is \$16.5 million in All Funds and reflects a \$2.6 million method of finance swap related to the B-On-Time Program.

### Maintained at 2024-25 funding levels

For the remaining strategy under Goal A, Computer Science Pipeline Initiative (A.1.4), the recommended funding amount matches the agency's requested amount.

### Goal B: Affordability and Debt

#### Increases

FAST Program (B.1.11). The recommended funding level is \$165.2 million in estimated IAC transfers from the Foundation School Program, which is an increase of \$36.5 million compared to the 2024-25 biennium. Additional information related to this House Bill 8 program is included later in this document.

#### Decreases

B-On-Time Balances (B.1.9). Senate Bill 30, 88<sup>th</sup> Legislature, appropriated \$141.5 million in estimated GR-D balances to the agency in fiscal year 2024. The B-On-Time account was abolished on September 1, 2024; therefore, no funding is included in the recommendations for the 2026-27 biennium. Additional information related to this issue is included later in this document.

## Maintained at 2024-25 funding levels

- TEXAS Grants (B.1.1). The recommended funding level is \$1,056.5 million and would support approximately 99,000 students per year.
- o Tuition Equalization Grants (B.1.2). The recommended funding level is \$203.8 million and would support approximately 29,000 students per year.
- TEOG Public Community College Grants (B.1.3). The recommended funding level is \$222.0 million and would support approximately 48,000 students per year.
- o **TEOG Public State/Technical College Grants (B.1.4).** The recommended funding level is \$22.2 million and would support approximately 2,400 students per year.
- College Work Study Program (B.1.5). The recommended funding level is \$18.3 million.
- o License Plate Scholarships (B.1.6). The recommended funding level is \$0.5 million in Other Funds.
- Educational Aide Program (B.1.7). The recommended funding level is \$1.0 million.
- o Texas Armed Services Scholarship Program (B.1.8). The recommended funding level is \$14.7 million.
- O Scholarship Program (B.1.10). The recommended funding level is \$1.0 million.
- o Texas Transfer Grant Program (B.1.12). The recommended funding levels is \$24.9 million.
- Texas Leadership Scholars Program (B.1.13) The recommended funding level is \$10.2 million.

#### **Goal C: Industry Workforce**

- Maintained at 2024-25 levels
  - o Bilingual Education Program (C.1.2). The recommended funding level is \$2.2 million.
  - Educational Loan Repayment Program (C.1.3). The recommended funding level is \$92.3 million. This strategy contains funding for seven loan repayment programs, including:
    - Teach for Texas Loan Repayment Program \$2.6 million
    - o Math and Science Scholar's Loan Repayment Program \$2.5 million
    - O Peace Officer Loan Repayment Program \$4.1 million
    - O Physician Education Loan Repayment Program \$35.5 million in GR-D funds
    - O Mental Health Loan Repayment Program \$28.0 million
    - Nursing Faculty Loan Repayment Program \$7.0 million
    - O Nurse Loan Repayment Program \$12.5 million
  - Workforce Education/Reskilling Programs (C.1.4). The recommended funding level is \$29.3 million. The strategy contains funding for two workforce/reskilling programs, the Texas Reskilling Through Upskilling Program (TRUE) and the Innovative Adult Career Education Grant Program, which is a program tied to House Bill 8, 88th Legislature.

## **Goal D: Industry Workforce-Health Related Programs**

#### Increases

O GME Expansion Program (D.1.3). Funding recommendations include \$304.4 million in All Funds, an increase of \$71.5 million from 2024-25 biennial funding levels, to meet the goal 1.1 to 1.0 ratio of first-year GME residency positions to Texas medical school graduates.

#### Decreases

Texas Child Mental Health Care Consortium (D.1.7). Recommendations include an increase of \$0.8 million over 2024-25 appropriated amounts, but do not include \$6.5 million in unexpended balances from fiscal year 2023 in the 2024-25 Base.

#### Maintained at 2024-25 levels

- o Family Practice Residency Program (D.1.1). The recommended funding level is \$16.5 million.
- o Preceptorship Program (D.1.2). The recommended funding level is \$4.9 million.
- GME Expansion (D.1.3). The recommended funding level is \$233.1 million, which includes \$211.1 million in General Revenue and \$22.0 million in distributions from the Permanent Fund Supporting Graduate Medical Education.
- O Trauma Care Program (D.1.4). The recommended funding level is \$5.9 million.
- Joint Admission Medical Program (D.1.5). The recommended funding level is \$11.7 million.
- o Professional Nursing Shortage Reduction Program (D.1.6). The recommended funding level is \$46.8 million.
- o Forensic Psychiatry Fellowship Program (D.1.8). The recommended funding level is \$5.0 million.
- Nursing Scholarships (D.1.9). The recommended funding level is \$12.5 million.
- o Rural Resident Physician Program (D.1.10). The recommended funding level is \$3.0 million.
- O Nursing Innovation Grant Program (D.1.11). The recommended funding level is \$6.0 million.

#### Goal E: Baylor College of Medicine

#### Increases

- The funding amounts for Baylor College of Medicine Undergraduate Medical Education and Baylor College of Medicine Graduate Medical Education are tied to Health-Related Institutions formulas
- Baylor College of Medicine Undergraduate Medical Education (E.1.1). Funding recommendations include \$91.0 million, an increase of \$14.3 million, from 2024-25 funding levels.
- O Baylor College of Medicine Graduate Medical Education (E.1.2). Funding recommendations include \$24.0 million, an increase of \$5.9 million, from 2024-25 funding levels.
- Baylor College of Medicine was appropriated \$3.5 million as one-time hold harmless formula funding by the 88th Legislature that is not included in 2026-27 recommendations.

#### Goal G: Trusteed Funds for Research

#### Increases

• Texas Research Incentive Program (G.1.1). Recommendations include \$409.7 million, an increase of \$376.4 million from 2024-25 biennial levels, contingent on the enactment of legislation repealing the program.

#### Maintained at 2024-25 levels

O Autism Program (G.1.2). Recommended funding level is \$7.4 million.

## 2. 2024-25 Funding Increases for Financial Aid and Health Programs

The 88<sup>th</sup> Legislature appropriated \$567.7 million in additional funding for financial aid programs and \$199.1 million in health programs for the 2024-25 biennium. The tables below contain information regarding these programs. The agency also received additional funding tied to House Bill 8, Baylor College of Medicine and other programs that are not reflected in these tables.

#### 3. Financial Aid Eligibility Projections

The information below reflects THECB's eligibility projections for TEXAS Grants, Texas Educational Opportunity Grants (TEOG)-Public Community Colleges, TEOG-Public State and Technical Colleges and Texas Equalization Grants (TEG) for the 2024-25 biennium, the agency's 2026-27 base line request and the agency's exceptional item request. Each table provides information on the number of students that receive initial year (IY) awards, students that receive renewal year (RY) awards, and the total population of students eligible for IY awards. For the TEXAS Grant program and TEOG programs, renewal students are prioritized. Once all renewal students have been awarded grants, institutions can allocate awards for initial awards. The TEG program does not prioritize renewal awards. The percentage of initial year eligible students represents the number of initial year students that received awards compared to the total population of initial year eligible students.

#### 4. Texas Research Incentive Program Overview

The Texas Research Incentive Program (TRIP) allows eligible institutions to vie for state matching funds awarded by THECB based on the amount an institution receives in private gifts to enhance research activities. Only emerging research universities, as defined by THECB, are eligible to receive matching funds through the program. Currently, eight institutions are classified as emerging research universities.

The state match depends on the amount of the gifts the institutions receive. If the total amount of the gift is \$1,00,000 or more, but less than \$999,999, 50 percent of the donations will be matched. If the total amount of the gift is \$1,000,000 or more, but less than \$1,999,999, 75 percent of the donations will be matched. If the total amount of the gift is \$2,000,000 or more, 100 percent of the donations will be matched. If the funds appropriated for the program are insufficient to provide matching grants for all qualifying gifts, THECB will provide matching grants for the remaining unmatched gifts in the following fiscal year to the extent funds are available. **Recommendations include \$409.7 million, an increase of \$376.4 million from 2024-25 biennial levels, contingent on the enactment of legislation repealing the program.** Recommendations fully fund the agency's exceptional item for the program. The table below shows the unmatched donations as of January 23, 2025, including eligible donations that have been approved by the Board and donations that have been received and are pending approval.

#### 5. Financial Aid for Swift Transfer (FAST)

The FAST program, which was created in House Bill 8, 88th Legislature, provides funding for public institutions of higher education to offer dual credit courses to educationally disadvantaged students, which are students eligible for the national free/reduced-price lunch program, at no cost. An eligible student will not pay tuition and fees for an eligible dual credit course and books and other course materials must also be provided at no cost. Recommendations include \$165.2 million in transfers from the Foundation School Program for the 2026-27 biennium. Below is information received from THECB that illustrates the funding that participating institutions received for eligible semester credit hours during the 2023-24 school year. The agency indicates that these amounts will increase once the last dual credit enrollments for spring and summer are certified, and funding is disbursed. Additional information regarding this program, and other House Bill 8 initiatives, will be included in the Community College Summary of Budget Recommendations packet.

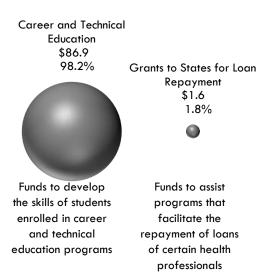

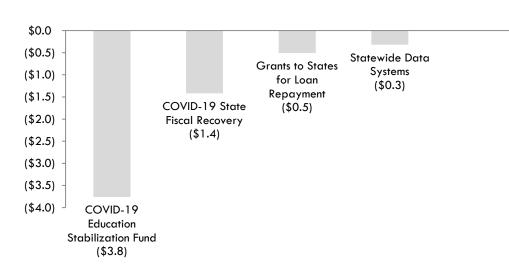

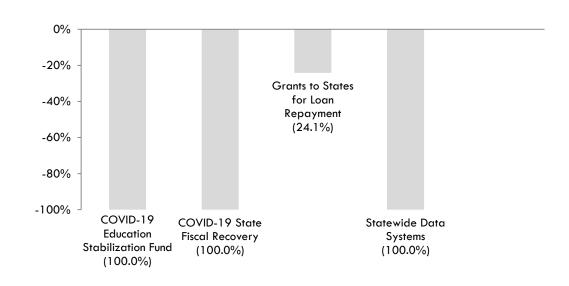


Programs with Significant Federal Funding Changes from 2026-27

#### **Modification of Existing Riders**

- 2. Capital Budget. Rider modified to reflect consolidation of two small capital budget items, Cybersecurity/Managed Security Data Center Services (\$95,000 per year) and Agency Application Portfolio Modernization Project (\$260,000 per year) into Data Center Consolidation item (\$5.9 million per year).
- 3. Commissioner's Salary. Rider modified to remove reference to using earned federal funds for the Commissioner's Salary.
- 10. **Tuition Equalization Grants.** Rider modified to remove requirement that agency provide updated information to LBB staff regarding the program prior to session. The information submitted in the agency's Legislative Appropriations Request, which is required by the rider, is the most up to date information available to the agency.
- 14. Collegiate License Plate Collections for Out of State Institutions. Rider modified to only include information for out of state institutions.
- 34. Advise TX. Rider #42, Advise TX Reporting Requirement, was consolidated into Rider #34.
